### LOOK UP!

Our local residents Red Girl and Trinity are sprucing up their home nursery and you can follow along via a webcam.

Red Girl and Trinity are Peregrine Falcons who live in a nest box high up on the Brandywine building. Spring is the beginning of the egg laying season for these fierce birds who were once on the endangered species list. So far there are 5 eggs! The box is visible from Midtown: look up West street to the 18 story building with the curved side. On the top floor facing us, count over from the left edge 7 windows and you'll see the box. With sharp eyes (or binoculars) you may be able to see Red Girl or Trinity perched on the ledge.

NOTICE! Street Cleaning Resumes Tue, Apr 5th.

Street cleaning occurs every Tue on one side of the street and Thu the other side is swept from Apr through Oct.

### Did You Miss It?

Mayor Purzycki Proposes a Fiscal Year 2023 Operating Budget. Here are the highlights!

- Elimination of 14 positions
- 7.5% property tax increase (the first in six years)
- 5% increase in water/sewer rates to fund regular and unanticipated costs associated with operating a water utility

Wilmington City Council is holding public hearings on the Mayor's budget proposal. Council is expected to vote on a new budget for Fiscal Year 2023 in late May with the budget taking effect on Jul 1.
