MICHAEL ANDERSON: DIVING DEEP TO SAVE CORAL REEFS

In the heart of Midtown Brandywine lives a man whose passion for the ocean has led to a global initiative. Michael "Mike" Anderson, a longtime resident of Midtown Brandywine and retired educator, has made it his life's work to preserve and restore one of the planet's most vital ecosystems: coral reefs. As the founder of the Aquarium Divers For Coral Society (ADFC), Mike's journey from a local educator to a global conservationist is a tale of passion, perseverance, and the power of community.

Mike Anderson: A Midtown Brandywine Resident with a Global Vision

"I've been here about seven and a half years," Mike reflects on his time in Midtown Brandywine. Previously residing in Forty Acres, Wilmington, and New Jersey, Mike's local roots run deep. But his love for the ocean and scuba diving, fostered through regular diving at the Adventure Aquarium, soon steered him towards a larger purpose. Birth of the ADFC.

ADFC's inception was a response to a pressing need Mike observed during his diving expeditions. "It was in Bonaire in 2013... I saw the first nursery for coral restoration, and it was like a hook," Mike recalls. His experiences in the Florida Keys, witnessing bleached and dying corals, further fueled his deter-

mination. "In 2016, we saw bleached out coral... the temperature of the water was like 89 degrees."

Frustrated by the barriers for volunteer divers in coral restoration and the dire need for help, Mike set forth to create ADFC in 2020, amidst the global pandemic. The organization, now a 501(c)3 non-profit, unites aquarium divers in a concerted effort to restore coral reefs.

Why Coral Matters: The Heart of Marine Ecosystems

"Coral reefs are essential to the ocean," Mike explains. "25% of all marine life lives in coral reefs." Like trees anchoring a mountain, corals are living animals that form the backbone of marine biodiversity. Their decline, Mike warns, not only affects marine life but also poses significant threats to human economies and coastal protections.

The Coral Crisis: A Call to Arms

"The biggest issue is the CO2 in the atmosphere," Mike highlights the primary driver of the Coral Crisis. The ocean's absorption of human-made CO2 has led to its acidification and heating, causing widespread coral bleaching and diseases like stony coral tissue loss disease.

PORCH PIRATES ON THE PROWL -- It's the time of year when porch pirates make their presence known by carting away those special gifts you looked high & low for. A recent article in AAA News made some suggestions that may prove helpful in preventing your special Santa Something from being snatched.

DELIVER TO A WORK ADDRESS -- If you're back in the office and your workplace allows it, have items sent to that address.

INSTALL A SECURITY CAMERA NEAR THE DELIVERY AREA -- Digitally-based security cameras connect to your phone or tablet. If someone triggers the camera, you'll receive a notification. Then, view the live footage or talk to the person via the security system's app.

* CREATE A PACKAGE RETRIEVAL ARRANGEMENT WITH NEIGHBORS -- If you aren't home, ask a neighbor to keep an eye on your property, particularly if you're traveling. Let them know when the package is scheduled to be delivered and they can keep a look out for it.

HAVE ORDERS SENT TO A CLOSE-BY AMAZON LOCKER -- I have personally used this approach for particularly valuable orders. Some of the lockers can be accessed 24/7, making pick up very convenient. Area locations can be seen here https://www.amazon.com/ulp/view.

None of these suggestions may be new to you - many Midtowners have security cameras - and no suggestion is fool-proof. Consider what steps make sense to you and take those steps to help prevent that very special gift from being pirated.

NATASHA POPPE: CRAFTING VOTES, ONE POSTCARD AT A TIME

In the world of digital bombardment, Natasha Poppe, a local artist and volunteer member of the Midtown Brandywine Neighbors' Association, is bringing a unique, personal touch to civic participation through voter postcarding. Her activity is not just about sending messages - it's a creative crusade to boost voter turnout across the United States, one beautifully crafted postcard at a time.

The Essence of Voter Postcarding

Voter postcarding is a grassroots initiative aimed at encouraging Americans to participate in the electoral process, especially in smaller, local elections that often go unnoticed. Volunteers across the country, including Natasha, create and send hand-written postcards to targeted voters, delivering a personalized appeal to engage in the democratic process. This nation-wide project focuses on raising awareness and growing voting as a behavior from the ground up, not just during presidential elections but for every opportunity that democracy presents.

"Voter postcarding is our way of gently nudging fellow Americans to participate in their civic duties," explains Natasha. "Each postcard is a piece of art, a tiny personal billboard, carrying a simple yet powerful message: your vote matters."

Natasha Poppe: A Creative Force in Civic **Engagement**

Natasha's voyage into voter postcarding began with

"Postcards to Voters," a national network of volunteers. "I was drawn to this initiative in 2017, and since then, it's been a journey of over 6,000 postcards and countless stories," she shares. Besides writing, Natasha mentors new volunteers through her YouTube channel, "DIY Voter Postcarding." "My channel is about empowering people. It's about showing that anyone can contribute, irrespective of their artistic skills. Multiple artists' shops have sprung up on Etsy, selling lovely cards, rubber stamps, and decorative tape with slogans. My goal has been to teach very simple 'fun and frugal' techniques anyone can learn, SAVE money, brighten their cards, and easily fill the space beyond the scripts we write."

Crafting a Community of Change

Natasha's postcards are more than just paper and ink. They are vibrant, whimsical, and full of life mirroring her belief in the power of personal connections. "I believe that a hand-printed card can make politics feel more personal, more human," she says. "It's not just about creating something beautiful; it's about sending a message from the heart – and something that might go on the fridge rather than the bin.

The Tangible Impact of a Thoughtful Gesture

The success of the Voter Postcarding efforts is reflected in the data. "We've seen studies, like one in Florida, showing that these postcards can make a real difference, especially in tight races," she notes.

Asked about his experience brokering homes in the neighborhood, he says, "It's been about a half dozen or so in the last five years, maybe a little more than that on the buying and selling side, of course, properties on Tatnall Street, West Street and in between."

Scott paints a picture of a neighborhood that's not just a place to live but a neighborhood with a true sense of local community.

"I'm a huge fan, quite frankly, of the Midtown Brandywine neighborhood. Historically, the Trolley Square neighborhood had been the hip, walkable neighborhood. But as it became less and less affordable, I started educating my buyers about the Midtown Brandywine community ...
